Matthew Shlian: New Work

An exhibition of works by paper engineer Matthew Shlian, who combines intricate geometric forms with exact folds and creases in arrays to form bas-relief sculptures.

Artist and designer Matthew Shlian, who describes himself as a paper engineer, gives patterns of life and motion to an otherwise flat form: paper. A lifelong fascination with geometric forms lead Shlian to experiment with paper folding, which lead to a short career in pop-up greeting cards. Shlian soon realized his concepts were larger and more complex than the greeting card industry would bear, and turned his sights to larger projects, eventually catching the attention of scientists who saw great potential in collaborating with him. Shlian, who has worked with scientists on research projects ranging from Alzheimer's Disease to solar panels, says, "Researchers see paper engineering as a metaphor for scientific principles; I see their inquiry as a basis for artistic inspiration." Artists and scientists both create work and investigate ideas from a common place: curiosity. It is by the act of asking questions—not giving answers—that both scientists and artists explore ideas and creative expression.

Shlian creates intricate three-dimensional geometric forms with exact folds and creases to form bas-relief sculptures. His works are often based on classic Islamic tile design principles, born out of years of study using geometry as a basis for patterning. The unit is as important as a whole and symmetry, proportion, light, shadow and repetition are all considered. Shlian explains, "My process is extremely varied from piece to piece. Often I start without a clear goal in mind, working within a series of limitations. For example on one piece I'll only use curved folds, or make my lines this length or that angle, etc. Other times I begin with an idea for movement and try to achieve that shape or form somehow."

There is an illusion of movement as the viewer's eye quickly travels back and forth throughout the piece. In this tangible art form, Shlian creates various geometric forms in a very malleable and unpredictable process. His starting point is curiosity. "I begin with a system of folding and at a particular moment the material takes over. Guided by wonder, my work is made because I cannot visualize its final realization; in this way I come to understanding through curiosity."

ABOUT MATTHEW SHLIAN

"As a paper engineer, my work is rooted in print media, book arts and commercial design. Beginning with an initial fold, a single action causes a transfer of energy to subsequent folds, which ultimately manifest in drawing and three dimensional forms. I use my engineering skills to create kinetic sculpture which have led to collaborations with scientists at University of Michigan. We work on the nanoscale, translating paper structures to micro folds.

Our investigations extend to visualizing cellular division and solar cell development. Researchers see paper engineering as a metaphor for scientific principles; I see their inquiry as a basis for artistic inspiration. In my studio I am a collaborator, explorer and inventor. I begin with a system of folding and at a particular moment the material takes over. Guided by wonder, my work is made because I cannot visualize its final realization; in this way I come to understanding through curiosity."

Matthew Shlian's work is derived from the intersectionality of art and science, where Shlian uses engineering skills and the aid of scientists at the University of Michigan to create intricate, geometric paper structures. While the process of executing each work is contingent upon precise measurements and a definitive degree of planning, Shlian describes that often, his final products are conceived from flaws that occur as the work is coming together. "Along the way something usually goes wrong and a mistake becomes more interesting than the original idea and I work with that instead. I'd say my starting point is curiosity; I have to make the work in order to understand it. If I can completely visualize my final result I have no reason to make it—I need to be surprised." Shlian engages with paper in a way that imbues movement into a material often associated with two dimensionality; the finished products are kinetic both for their visual

dynamics and in the way the folds physically project from the background. Shlian works in a variety of colors, but often defaults to white—where the added flatness of the color encourages viewers to examine the work more closely and establish their own readings of the work's depth.

ABOUT TURNER CARROLL GALLERY
